Presentations Sought

A wide range of proposals on all aspects of engineering heritage are sought, and will be included. The 'scope of program' page at the end will help you understand the possibilities. Both 'heritage of engineering' and 'engineering of heritage' papers are sought.

Presentation length should generally be 20-40 minutes including question time. Short presentations are still very effective. Pictures are powerful communicators. An electronic version is required by the time of the conference for the proceedings which is published as a CD. Fitting the 'improvement' theme, papers should describe projects that led to improvement or learning. More than just telling a story they should include analysis. When presenting a place, minimise the broad history and focus on why the place is important. When presenting systems, minimise descriptions and focus on the issues that were faced, the solutions developed, and why they were successful.

Email your proposal to John Gardiner (see above). In making a proposal use the format below:

- Your name
- Your organisation name
- Your role or title or position
- Category: Recognising, preserving, or promoting.
- Title of paper
- Time required for paper
- Time required for questions
- Synopsis of 60 to 120 words
- Power point, slide projector, or overheads

The first-cut of papers selected will be notified on 20 May. The choice will be made by a small working group of the IPENZ National Committee. Presenters then have two months to finalise presentations.

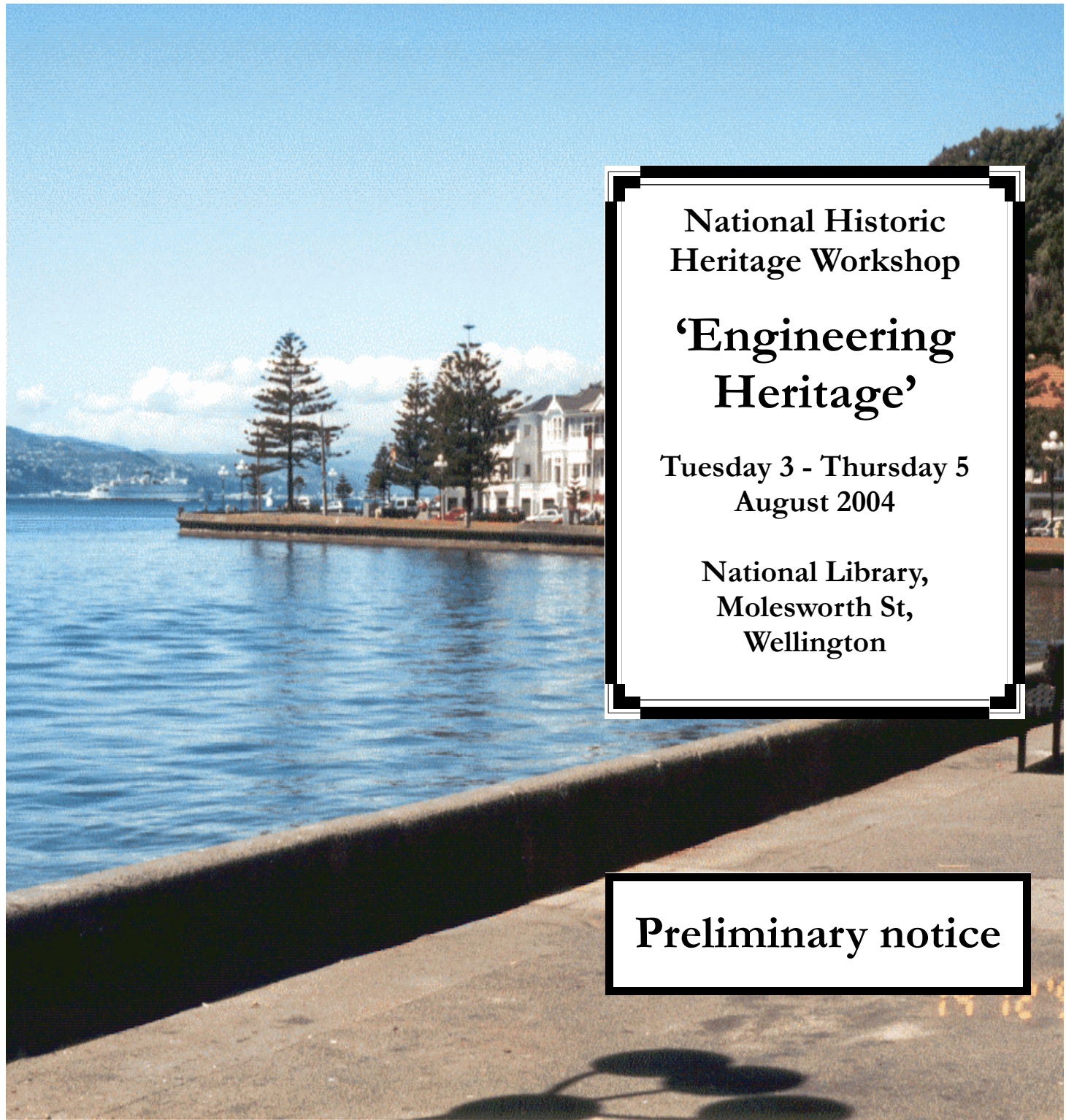
